

Ethnic Studies is a semester-long Social Science course designed for 9th grade students. As an interdisciplinary introduction to Social Science, the course provides the foundation for the later study of World and United States History, Economics, and United States Government. This course also blends in contemporary global issues with every unit of study. This course will introduce and develop skills that will be needed in subsequent Social Studies classes, such as evaluating sources, analyzing social change over time, and comparing and contrasting diverse cultures.

In addition to the skills and concepts described, students in Ethnic Studies will learn academic reading, writing and speaking skills. A lot of attention will be focused on how to interact with text and how to think critically about what you've read.

Textbook

Primary Text: Our Stories in Our Voices (Kendall Hunt) c. 2017, Allender & Mark. The book will be used exclusively in class. Students will not need to bring it home. Students will also use A Different Mirror (Back Bay Books) c. 2008, Takaki as a supplement text.

Students will also be reading a variety of additional texts, including news articles, personal narratives and literature.

Grading Policy

All assignments are worth points and grades will be calculated based on the amount of points earned in each category. Most work will be completed <u>in class</u>, during class time. Work will be divided into the following categories:

Academic Expectations
