Camera Composition: Introduction to Digital Photography

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Course Descriptions

This cell phone Camera Composition course will help students understand the how and why behind certain photographs seemingly just "look better than others. In this class, students will learn about the art of photography and enhance their approach to photography by exploring the Elements of Art and the Principles of Design. Students will plan, create, explore, shoot, edit and critique interesting photographs.

Additionally, students will learn about the history of photography and photographic technology, and will be introduced to a number of significant, well-known photographers and their contributions to the history of photography. Students will become aware of the various careers within the field of photography and the categories of professional photography, including nature photography, commercial photography, fashion photography, sports photography, portraiture and even photography and photojournalism, By the end of this



course, students will have designed and constructed a digital portfolio of their photography, which will showcase their photography assignments and allow them to observe and track their learning.

Note to the students and the parents: even though this is a beginning photography class, we study all forms of photography, which is an art form. I make every effort to make sure that the photographic subjects we examine are suitable for high school students, but while we do not study boudoir, lingerie or nude photography, it is quite possible that your

student may come across nudity or near-nudity while researching photographers or photographic genres online or in class. This is much like a walk through any museum. In the course of studying important historic photographs we will come across some that are troubling and difficult to look at. We do this because it illustrates the power of photography to tell an important story and for no other reason than that these photos of war, injustice, hardship and pain have changed lives and at times, history.

Course topics:

This course will cover the following topics:

- 1. Define photography
- 2. History of photography
- 3. Copyrights regarding photographs
- 4. How to participate in a critique
- 5. Composition Elements of art and design
- 6. Personal expression
- 7. Digital photography
- 8. Managing & editing photos using Photopea and Snapseed.
- 9. Commercial photography

Class Expectations:

- Students are expected to respect self and others, take responsibility, be safe and caring and do your best everyday.
- Students are expected to arrive at class on time and to be prepared to work with all of the materials necessary for class. Students are encouraged to bring cellphones and laptops to class. Headphones can also be used especially during editing. Please monitor where you electronics are at all times. They are your responsibility.
- Cooperate with other students and staff to increase learning potential.
- Take part in class discussion and critiques of photos presented in class.
- Be prepared with a pen/pencil and all your photography supplies this includes all charged electronics. It might be necessary to bring charging cords to school.
- Students are expected to keep up with assignments and effectively use all of class time.
- All work is due on the assigned due date unless special arrangements are made. It is your responsibility to make arrangements ahead of time.
- Students are expected to display their artwork. All artwork should be appropriate. Anything questionable will be referred to the administration.
- Students may be required to complete field work directly connected to curriculum work. When students use the class CC passes to do outdoor or for school community shoots, they will act in a mature manner at all times, have visible their student ID, and return to class at a specific set time. They will comply with staff if asked to show their CC pass.
- Students will care for all classroom equipment. Tampering with equipment and supplies will result in loss of privileges. There will be *no food or drink allowed in class*.

- Students are to avoid shooting photos in or near other classrooms so they will not disrupt the teacher and learning of others.
- Students are to use the MacBooks/Chromebooks for class work only. Inappropriate use of the laptop (game playing, google chat, other off-task use) will result in having a chat with the teacher, privately.
- If a student would like a different seating assignment, the student will ask the teacher.

Grading Information:

Formative assessments will be used to help you and your teacher understand where you are in your learning and what kinds of support you need before you have a summative assessment. They include things such as observations during class and lessons, photographs, digital skills assignments, writing assignments, narrative reflections, in class work and quizzes. Students will receive feedback, formal or informal on formative assessments.

Summative assessments will be used to show you and the teacher the level to which you have mastered a learning target or competency. They include things such as art projects, longer writing assignments, presentations and tests.

Final assessment (project/exam): This will be a culmination of all core art competencies. Your grade in this class will reflect your level of mastery of the material, equipment and processes. Throughout the course this level of mastery will be evaluated through both formative and summative assessments.
